## From the Rector

A few days before I wrote this, I was wondering to myself was there ever a time when people had no worries, and I came to the conclusion that probably the answer is No! But there are times when there are more issues to threaten us with anxiety than at others. We live in one of those time, when humanity should be worrying over the environmental issues such as plastic pollution and global warming, and in our own corner there is the threatened disruption that was nicknamed 'Brexit'. It was coined as recently as 2012, according to the Oxford Dictionary.

The Christian faith is most relevant in anxious times. Jesus lived in such a period when there was tension between Jews and everyone else, and a much disliked Roman occupation of the land. Even within Judaism there were tensions between Pharisees and Sadducees over eternal life (Resurrection or simply some form of existence) and over politics (cooperate with the Romans or not)

Jesus spent much time in prayer, and so should we: prayer as an awareness of the God within our lives, and without. The God who Jesus taught and showed was on the one hand a divinity who sought to form a personal relationship with his creation, a task given to humanity as a responsibility of care. This God knows each one of us personally and individually: as Jesus wonderfully phrased it, even the hairs on our head are numbered.

However, he also holds the whole world in his hands. The peace of God passes all understanding in that we can never really grasp his scale. In these anxious times we should have no fears or worries but trust ourselves into his care and keeping. Strange things have happened which are the fruit of selfishness and a fear of change, and

## Select Vestry

The Select Vestry met on Dec 10th. We examined the Parish finances which are basically sound, but only so when we can avoid being in debt to the bank for much of the year, as even organised and arranged overdrafts are subject to punitive interest charges. We paid none last year because reserved funds for special purposes were in hands awaiting work being undertaken, but which are now being spent on the replastering and repainting recently undertaken in St Andrew's Church and the necessary renovation of the Old School House. We are therefore dependent on the generosity of parishioners to keep us afloat financially.

One of the pleasing parts of business was the annual distribution of 10% of plate and envelope offerings, and €9,970 was distributed to a number of charities and mission agencies at home and abroad. Another pleasing business was a presentation to Hazel Bolton, People's Churchwarden to mark her retirement as Hon Secretary to the Select Vestry following the last Easter Vestry after about 40 years service. The Rector presented Hazel with a bouquet and a gift at the conclusion of the service.

## Ecumenical Activity

Our local ecumenical committee has been very active, and will be marking the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity with a special service in St Sylvester's RC Church on Wednesday 23rd January at 8.00 pm at which the address will be given by Rt Rev Trevor Williams, formerly Bishop of Limerick and Killaloe. Bishop Trevor is a Dubliner who, as well as Parish Ministry, has served as Church of Ireland Chaplain in Queen's University, with the BBC as a religious affairs director and also is a former Leader of the Corrymeela Community which has done so much work reconciling the divided communities of Northern Ireland during the Troubles and until the present day. Their continuing work reminds us that bigotry and division have not gone away.

Trevor's theme will be on reconciliation as a vital part of Christian witness and the Ecumenical Committee will be continuing on this theme on the Wednesday evenings in Lent. These meetings which have been a very successful venture for many years, are held in a different local church each night and help us to think and live together sharing common Christian faith and witness. Full details will be in the next issue of the Mirror and on the parish website.

## Lent

The origins of Lent are obscure, although from the earliest days of the Church believers would prepare for the solemn celebration of Easter through prayer and fasting, the premise being that self-denial and reflection serve to intensify the ultimate joy of the resurrection.

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## St. Andrew's Nave Walls restored to Original Condition



During our unseasonably hot summer of 2018, we commenced on a programme to resolve the issue of plasterwork falling from the walls of the nave in St. Andrew's Church.

Having sought expert advice on the cause of the problem and the processes to be undertaken to remedy the situation, we subsequently contracted a company, specialising in Victorian plastering techniques to undertake the restoration project.

The first phase of the work involved the careful removal of all plaster from both walls of the nave. This was a slow and tedious task, carried out using hand chisels, to avoid unnecessary stress to the walls or causing damage to the stained glass windows and their surroundings.

Several layers of a lime based plaster were subsequently applied to the bare walls, allowing time for drying out between each application. The drying process was considerably helped by the unusual hot summer weather. All plastering was finally completed by early September.

The repainting of the walls was deferred until November to allow the plasterwork to fully dry out.

The final phase of the project involved the application of five coats of a white lime based paint, thereby completing the restoration work to the original Victorian standards that were typically used during the construction of the church extension in 1870.

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Liturgically, the word alleluia is not used during this season and joyous anthems and hymns, such as the Gloria in excelsis, are either not used or are replaced by penitential offerings. Some speculate that fasting became an integral part of the observance of Lent simply because food stores were depleted anyway by the end of winter and early spring. Indeed, our word Lent is derived from an old Germanic word for spring and the lengthening (you're right...same root meaning...) of days. In most European languages, however, Lent is called by a name which references the forty days – cuaresima in Spanish, for instance. Hungarian 'nagyböjt' simply refers to the "great fast" of Lent. By the fifth century, a forty-day Lenten observance was common in the West while in the East fifty or even more days were, and continue to be, observed. Interestingly, the Sundays in Lent, being themselves mini-observances of the Resurrection, have always been exempt from Lenten acts of penitence.

The Church strongly recommends fasting to the faithful during Lent – but especially on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Consider skipping a meal these days, if your health permits, and avoiding meat. And of course plan to attend our services these days. It is a common practice today to give up something for Lent as a sign of penitence and repentance. Smokers often give up smoking. Others give up dessert or chocolate. On the other hand, some people try to do more during Lent – volunteering perhaps to help those in need or spending more time in prayer and reflection on a daily basis. The choice is up to each Christian.

## Church of Ireland Gazette

The Gazette has for many years been in newspaper format and has appeared weekly. The Board of the Gazette have decided that it will now become a monthly magazine, which it was originally.

Existing subscribers will be continued, and others may like to become subscribers. The new format will enable higher quality production and a much wider amount of contact, both about what is happening across the island, but also abroad and a number of very high format writers have been recruited for the new format. 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## Weekly Envelope and Direct Debit schemes.

These are a vital and major part of our income and we ask that every family please use the scheme. Not only does it give a regular flow of income through the year, but we can reclaim income tax on all donations of €250 or more! If you want envelopes or a direct debit form, please contact the Rector, or Anne Taplin in the Parish Office, and they will make the necessary arrangements.

One point that puzzles many! If you have a direct debit in operation, you may receive a box of envelopes. The reason is that the box has to be printed (we cannot just print the numbers we need) so you might as well have it! Some people regularly top up their direct debit by occasional use of their envelopes, perhaps on a special occasion or when they feel particularly blessed!!

## Revision of Register of Vestrypersons

Adult members of the parish who are active in our affairs, should register for the General Vestry Register which will be revised at the February meeting of the Select Vestry. Forms are available from the Rector or churchwardens. The 'Resident' form is for those who live within the parish boundaries, the 'Accustomed Member' form is for those who live outside the boundary. Only members of the General Vestry can vote at the General Vestry meeting, hold office on the Select Vestry, or be elected as members of the Diocesan Synod or as Parochial nominators.
