From the Rector

I would like to thank all those who so generously supported our appeal for additional funds. It meant that by July we were in the position of not having to pay interest on borrowings at a usurious rate, and this in itself represents a considerable saving for the parish. Regular giving by all of us either through the envelope scheme or by standing orders evens out our cash flow through the year, and enables the Select Vestry to look forward into a future where we can concentrate on the spiritual as well as the material aspect of parish life.

This issue of the Mirror will show that the Select Vestry have been working hard, considering seriously the suggestions made at last year's Parish Forum, evaluating them and putting them into practice and this process will continue. Changes have been made in the sphere of worship, and new developments in the development of youth and children's ministry on a rural deanery basis are in hand.

However, we must always remember that we are responsible for maintaining our buildings and these cost money. Utilities companies do not give us any concessions because we are a charity! The glebewardens, Andy Bailey and Ian Watkins, have done, and still do, an amazing job in ensuring that our costs are minimised while jobs are done properly, and we should be aware of their skills and their sacrifice of their valuable time in a voluntary capacity on our behalf. And the bills come in relentlessly. We have just had the Diocesan Architect's five-yearly inspection of the glebe, and his report will no doubt bring to attention matters which have to be attended to, as well as work on St Doulagh's roof which will need to be tackled in the near future

Parish Finances ---- Mid-Year Update

Having completed the first 6 months of 2015, it is a good time to review how our parish is progressing financially against the plan set up at the beginning of this year.

I am pleased to report that total income for the year up to the end of June was €104,000 which exceeded our estimates by almost €14,000. The main contributors to the strong performance were the early payment by the Revenue of the tax rebate on donations, to the value of €8,500 (this was originally planned to happen during the second half of the year) and increased contributions by parishioners to the envelope scheme. It was also encouraging to note that more parishioners have continued to switch from cash contributions in envelopes, to making payments by Standing Orders, which is very helpful in planning our finances.

On behalf of the Select Vestry I would like to express my sincere thanks to all parishioners for their generous contributions, particularly at these times of great austerity with so many demands on personal finances.

Expenditure for the half-year was recorded at €105,000, slightly better than plan, with property-related expenditure the only area where there was an over-run.

Overall, it has been a good performance for the year to date. Let's keep up the momentum for the remainder of the year.

(Cambridge), Paula (Edinburgh) and Robina (Cornwall) and to all the family in their great loss.

Until the death some years ago of her husband, Stanley, Joan Baldwin was a regular attendee at St Andrew's but, unable to drive, she then attended Clontarf Church for their mid-week Eucharist. At her request, her service was a simple one in Glasnevin Crematorium, conducted by the Rector of Clontarf, Rev Lesley Robinson.

We also note the passing of Archdeacon Macartan Brady, Roman Catholic Parish Priest of Malahide from 1973 to 1992. A complete gentleman, he and Canon Gough Cooper, who shared Ulster origins, were good friends for many years. After his retirement, he continued to assist in the parish until some years ago when he moved into Sybil Hill Nursing Home. Daily Matins

From the beginning of September, Matins will be said each morning in St Andrew's at 9.15 am. It is a short service of prayer, scripture reading and reflection. It is based on the seven daily offices of monastic life, which in late medieval times were often used by literate laity. Archbishop Cranmer used the ancient service books as the basis for two services to be said daily in all parish churches, and while this is no longer a rule, we have observed the morning office for most of the year for the past 25 years.

All are welcome to come along. The service lasts for about 15mins. Cars may be parked in the Rectory for the service, but must be removed immediately afterwards.

This quiet time of devotion is the original and proper setting for Morning Prayer which was originally intended to be read daily, and on Sundays was a prelude to Holy Communion and the current modern services include an office at the beginning. Morning Prayer became the normative Anglican Sunday worship largely as a reaction to the abuse of the Eucharist in the medieval church which led to a fear of regular Holy Communion, although all Christian traditions to that time knew no other Sunday worship than the Liturgy (East) or Mass (West). In the last 100 years, the Eucharist has been restored in many parishes as the normal form of worship in accordance with the practice of the Early Church, which was the aim of the Anglican Reformers who stressed their continuity with the Early Church.

Confirmation

This will be held in the spring on a day yet to be announced. There will be two groups: any adults should have a chat with the Rector, (if they have not already done so) who will arrange suitable instruction. Teenagers' classes will be held in St Marnock's Chapel after the Sunday evening service, but names should be given to the Rector or to Jamie Heffelfinger. The first evening will be on Sunday 27th September at 6.30 pm, and parents and guardians are also asked to attend.

ALL CANDIDATES SHOULD BE 14 YEARS OF AGE BY THE CONFIRMATION DATE, PROBABLY IN MAY 2016 and are expected to attend worship regularly.

Any young people who may have been baptised and confirmed in the Roman Catholic Church are not re-confirmed, but may attend classes as a way of learning about the Anglican tradition.

Beaumont Hospital Chaplaincy

Mrs Desiree Prole, who has been Church of Ireland chaplain in Beaumont for many years, and who has done a wonderful job in that important role, has retired and I have been informed by the Diocese that it has not been possible to fill the vacancy at the present time. **Until an appointment has been made, please note that if anyone is admitted to Beaumont Hospital, it is more important than ever to tell the Rector so that pastoral**

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care can be provided.

Youth Work

Thanks to those who have volunteered to help with the Children's Programme on those Sundays when the 11.30 am service is not 'All Age'. Anyone else who can assist will be welcome, please tell me or Jamie!

Children's Worship

On each Sunday, there is one service which seeks to relate to the younger members of the parish. The times vary so that there is at least one service a month at a time that should suit most families!

On the **1st Sunday 'Messy Church'** at 6.30 pm, Worship and learning through activity and music for young and old, parents and kids, followed by refreshments and fellowship.

On the **2nd Sunday 'All Age' Communion** at 11.30 am, a simple service which will help our young people understand what and why Anglican worship takes the form it does, followed by refreshments in the Chapel

On the **3rd Sunday, 'Toddlers' Service'** at 10.30 am, some songs, a Bible Story and some simple prayers for those under 6, lasting about 20 minutes, followed by refreshments

On the **4th Sunday, 'All Age Service'** at 11.30 am, a simple service for all ages, followed by refreshments.

'All-Age' means 'what it says on the box,' and means something for everyone!

We would like to thank all those who help with these services, Jamie and Katie Heffelfinger, Sharon Williams and also Christine Mullock, Susan Gamble and Claire Grogan, who organise refreshments.

Harvests

The season for harvest thanksgiving is upon us again! While we are an urban parish, we are still dependent on the bounty of the earth and the sea for our food and this is the time to give thanks to God in a very special way for all his blessings. This year a collection will be made at all harvest services in both churches for charitable donations in the name of the parish. We all have much to thank God for, and I trust that we will all be generous in our response. Many charities and good causes approach us each year for donations. All are worthy causes and we would like to be able to respond generously to what are nearly always worthy purposes. Donations should be made using the envelopes marked "Charities Donation" which will be available in the pews and for those who cannot attend the harvest thanksgiving services, envelopes will also be available in the Parish Centre.

The Harvest in St Andrew's will be held on 27th September and we will be asking everyone to be involved. We need more folk to help with the decoration of the Church and for gifts of flowers, fruit and vegetables. This will be done on the Saturday morning and we may also make sure that the Church Grounds are a credit to us, with some additional work to supplement Rory's weekly attention.

The children will be involved in the leading of our worship which will be within the context of the 'All Age' format with readings and the well-known harvest hymns.

The preacher this year will be Dr Katie Heffelfinger. Katie is not just married to our Youth Worker, Jamie, but is a lecturer in the Church of Ireland Theological Institute and a highly-respected New Testament scholar in these islands and in her native USA! She is also a mum which makes her very aware of how to appeal to the young!

St Doulagh's Harvest will be held as usual on the 2nd Sunday of October (11th). There will be two services, one at 10.00 am when the preacher will be Canon Cecil Hyland, formerly Rector of Howth and with strong ties in the parish. Cecil was formerly Church of Ireland Youth Worker and chaplain in TCD before being Rector of Tullow (Carrickmines) and Howth. He now lives in 'retirement' in Skerries.

At 7.00 pm the preacher will be Canon John McKegey, formerly Rector of Armagh. Before his recent retirement to Portrush, John served as curate in Ballynafeigh (Belfast) and Bangor, and rector of Rathfriland, Gilnahirk and Armagh and has left his mark wherever he has been. John has always been to the forefront of ecumenism and has numbered cardinals among his close friends. He and I met in TCD where we both shared an interest in railways which has kept us in close touch for over 40 years, and he was responsible both for conducting our marriage, and that of my mother! More to the point, John has a reputation as an excellent preacher.

The evening harvest is an opportunity to introduce friends and neighbours to the charm of St Doulagh's. The service is Evening Prayer which is theologically acceptable to all and invitations are sent each year to the members of the other churches in the area. ALL ARE MOST CERTAINLY WELCOME

Parish Development Plan 2015: Progress report

- To be a flourishing parish: To have services, programmes and activities that our people want to be involved in now and into the future.
- A community of people who worship together, pray together, grow together, learn together and care together
- A parish that makes a difference ---where our Lord is central to all we do
- A living parish that reaches out to others

Key Objectives

1. WORSHIP & PASTORAL CARE

A Worship working group with specific terms of reference and boundaries working with the Rector is established and meeting. A new pattern of Services aimed at being inclusive of children and young people has begun:

1st Sunday: Messy Church at 6.30 pm. Attendances have been in the 30 range group in the summer months

2nd Sunday: All Age Eucharist at 11.30 am, using a selection of material approved by the House of Bishops and also from other sources. This will increasingly bring in younger folk to read lessons and prepare intercessions, and will use different material each month, aimed at challenging all of us to think about their faith. It will also contain elements helping all of us to understand the central significance of the Eucharist as the central act of Christian worship. The services will be c. 45 minutes and a refreshment rota is evolving for coffee etc. afterwards

3rd Sunday: Toddler Service, at 10.30. Duration about 20 minutes, organised by the Rector, Sharon Williams with assistance Lynn Harley and other parents. Turnout 30 to 70. Jamie and Norman attend to make contact with parents and children and act as MC.

4th Sunday: All Age Service, simpler prayers and hymns. Mothers' Union members help with refreshments

On **5th Sunday:** Morning Prayer will be at 11.30 am, and also to use the modern canticles as in the Church Hymnal.

The modern canticles are also being introduced in St. Doulagh's.

Other developments:

A copy of the new Supplementary Hymnal, 'Thanks and Praise' is being obtained for examination by Rodney and the Rector. This may be of use on All Age services where a service leaflet is now being compiled.

New volunteers have agreed to help with Children's church, Garda Vetting forms are being processed.

2. YOUTH WORK – for progress to date, reference separate report under heading "Youth News"

3. SOCIAL FELLOWSHIP/ SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

The Social Committee has been re-established and is being co-ordinated by Richard Firth. A BBQ was held in June and another BBQ is being planned for 13th September after church in St Andrew's.

4. BUILDINGS & FACILITIES:

Our buildings support the activities and facilitate greater parishioner involvement. The Parish Centre Committee and glebewardens are working on a proactive repair and maintenance plan.

5. COMMUNICATION / Communicate well

The Communications Committee has developed a facebook page and a new Welcome / information pack will be launched in September.

6. ECUMENICAL

The Ecumenical Group is working on the 2015/2016 programme

St. Andrew's Recipe

Key Lime Pie

Base:

- 250g digestive biscuits or chocolate chip cookies
- 100g butter, melted



Filling:

- 405g can Carnation Condensed Milk
- Finely grated zest and juice of 5 large limes
- 300ml carton double cream

(9in) round loose-bottomed tart tin.

Method:

1. Mix the crushed biscuits with the melted butter in a bowl.
2. Press the crumbs into the base and up the sides of the tin. Chill for 10 minutes.
3. Whisk together the condensed milk and cream, then add the lime juice and zest (watch it magically thicken!). Pour into the tart case and chill for at least 1-2 hours.
4. Remove the pie from the tin and place on a serving plate. Cut into slices and serve with crème fraîche and lime zest. (Optional)
