

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Parish Finances----- A Mid-Year Update

Having recently completed the first half of 2019, it is time to provide you with a summary on how your parish is progressing financially. Overall, the position is satisfactory and is broadly in line with projections.

Income for the 6 months amounted to €90k. The main areas of contribution are highlighted in the attached chart.




Parish Expenditure, (Excluding Capital

Projects) amounted to €94k, leaving us with a small deficit of €3.5k. The breakdown of the major elements is indicated in the following chart.

Capital Reserves have been significantly depleted over the 6 months, from €99k at the start of the year to €58k at end of June. This reduction is in line with the

plan to support the 2 major projects that we are currently carrying out: St. Doulagh's Restoration and Refurbishment of the Old Schoolhouse. The reserve fund will continue to be depleted during the 2nd half of the year and the challenge we face as we complete the projects will be to minimise bank borrowing.

On behalf of the Select Vestry, I would like to thank all parishioners for their valued and generous contributions to parish finances. I look forward to your continued support during the remainder of 2019.

St Doulagh's Restoration

Those passing by will be forgiven for thinking that St Doulagh's is being turned into a fortress as it is encased in scaffolding and steel panels. Our contractor has removed the weed from the cracks between the stones and is now replacing the damaged mortar with new where necessary, using a medieval recipe. We are however, still 'open for business' for Sunday worship. The work has been somewhat slower than anticipated and unfortunately the scaffolding may remain 'in situ' until into the autumn, but when it is completed the tower will no longer look like a ruin, especially in the new floodlighting which gives a rather eerie appearance to those passing by on the road!

Confirmation Classes

Classes will begin this year on Sunday 8th September at 6.30pm in St Andrew's Church. Candidates should be 14 by the probable date of confirmation in the spring.

Parents are also required to attend on the first evening when we will explain the course. As yet, we have no actual date for Confirmation but this is expected shortly.

What is confirmation? It is the taking of one's baptismal vows as an adult, followed by the bishop laying hands in blessing upon the candidates. It is a sacramental rite which has its origin in the growth of the Church when baptism, which was originally conducted by bishops, was devolved to parish clergy. However, the prayer for the Holy Spirit and the associated anointing, was retained by the bishop in the Western Church.

At the Reformation, Anglicans retained confirmation, but the proper age of confirmation was laid down as 14, the age when many young people at the time left home to take up work or apprenticeships.

From time to time, adults who have not been confirmed at the normal age, wish to be confirmed to express their faith or their membership of the Church, and there is nothing wrong with this. Please contact the Rector who will arrange adult classes at a convenient time.

Glendalough Camino 2019 – Timetable

The annual Dublin & Glendalough diocesan pilgrimage, the Glendalough Camino, will take place on Saturday September 14. Pilgrims taking part can choose to walk the full route from Hollywood to Glendalough or follow a number of shorter trails during the day.

The pilgrimage has traditionally taken place on a Sunday but has been moved to a Saturday this year following feedback from clergy of the dioceses. This will facilitate clergy taking part in this diocesan event with their parishioners.

The Glendalough Camino connects two churches at either end of St Kevin's Way – St Kevin's Church in Hollywood and St John's Church in Laragh. For those planning to follow the full 30 kilometre Camino along St Kevin's Way, there will be a Pilgrims Blessing in the ancient pilgrim church of **St Kevin's Hollywood** at 9.00 am on Saturday morning. They should allow six hours to complete the route.

Throughout the day, pilgrims will be facilitated to take shorter journeys with a mini-bus being laid on to transport people from **St John's Church in Laragh**, which is at the Glendalough end of the route, to the Wicklow Gap at regular intervals.

All participants on all the routes are invited to attend the short closing service which takes place at the stone ring fort on the shores of the Upper Lake in Glendalough at 5.00pm.

A bus will be provided to bring people back to Hollywood at about 5.30pm. Those wishing to avail of this service must register and provide contact details before departing from St Kevin's Church in the morning.

St Doulagh's Church

The following interview with Ken McAllister, former Glebe-warden of St. Doulagh's, was first published in the **Fingal Independent** on June 29th 2019. Reprinted by permission.



Medieval St Doulagh's Church in Kinsealy hides a number of dark secrets from the unsuspecting pilgrim, making it all the more interesting to visitors and offering ample material for children's tales.

The 1150AD Church of Ireland building holds features that one would believe unbecoming of a Christian place of worship, making it perfect fodder for ghouls and a tourist attraction in its own right.

The cheerfully named 'Lepers Window' sits at the back of the ancient chapel, and offers a glimpse into life during the middle ages, and how churchgoers treated those with medical complaints.

Leprosy was quite common in the Middle Ages, apparently even in the Kinsealy/Balgriffin area. Lepers, of course, would need to be segregated from the general townsfolk, with their living quarters, if they had such, being kept away from the rest of the population.

The dermatologically challenged of Kinsealy/Balgriffin were no less holy than other churchgoers, and provision was therefore made for them to 'attend' service by standing outside of the church building, gazing in through the 'Leper's Window' onto the priest.

More macabre perhaps was the 'Murder Hole', situated two floors above the church entrance. Unfortunate intruders were subjected to 'The Murder Hole' when boiling oil or water was poured from above on top of their heads. The multi-functional hole could also be used for dropping arrows from on high.

Another feature you wouldn't expect to find in St Doulagh's are holes in the upstairs walls, where arrows could be shot at invaders, who apparently were quite common in their day.

High up in St Doulagh's towers was the luxury of the priest's quarters, a not too unpleasant room where he could sit and read, and pray that attackers didn't venture in.

A deliberately uneven staircase leading to the tower, however, meant that if the priest were caught unawares, he could give one strong push to the intruder, who would

lose his footing and hopefully meet his untimely demise.

By all means pay a visit to the magnificent St Doulagh's but be warned - it's not for the fainthearted!

Resting between Kinsealy and the village of Balgriffin on the Malahide Road, a medieval church and its ancient graves sit silently and ominously behind overgrown trees, enticing visitors to venture in for a piece of its history.

Just visible from the roadside, the tower of St Doulagh's stands peering above the trees, offering just a glimpse of what lies within.

The 'old' church, as one walks in, is in slight disrepair, but stands proud against the evening sky.

Here, one can sense St Doulagh's gravitas, its imposing walls and holy presence inviting the devout to come in and pray.

And yet, it is also clear that some attendance is needed, the discoloured limestone and moist floors betraying its centuries old age.

The church's keeper, Ken McAllister, a former Glebe Warden and now member of the Select Vestry, explained his plans to bring the old church back to its former glory: 'There's the medieval part of the church, and there's what we call the modern part of the church, which is about one hundred and fifty years old.

'The old part dates from about 1150, and there's five churches that we know of in Ireland that are very similar to it.

'What makes it unique is the stone roof, it's slabs of stone for the roof, and there's only St Doulagh's, Cormac's Chapel in Cashel, St Kevin's in Glendalough, St Columba's House in Kells and St Mochta's in Louth that have a stone roof.

'At the moment, we're concentrating on restoring the medieval part. It's leaking, and it's letting in a lot of water and it's washing out the water between the stones. It's not unstable, but as it goes on, it could become so, and if we don't do something now, it's going to get worse.'

So far, with an estimated €80,000 needed to carry out this year's preliminary work, the parish has raised €30,000-€40,000 towards the restoration of St Doulagh's. Ken has applied for heritage grants to subsidise the remainder, which he said should be around another €40,000.

Grants are awarded through Fingal County Council from the Department of Culture, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, while other heritage grants are also available for the restoration work.

Funds have also been raised through local tourism and Heritage Week in particular, and the project was finally underway last week.

Ken explained: 'Before they built the modern church, one hundred and fifty years ago, their aim was to conserve this church.

'The clergyman that was here in the 1850s decided that something better be done about it, like we're doing now.

'It's probably one of the oldest churches in continual use

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St Kevin's Way is one of the recognised Celtic Camino routes and those planning to walk the Camino de Santiago can get their Camino Passports stamped at the beginning and the end of the day to count towards the completion of their Compostela.

TIME TABLE

9:00am: St. Kevin's Church, Hollywood – Pilgrims intending to complete the full St Kevin's Way will be sent out with a Pilgrim's Blessing. Anyone wishing to avail of the bus back to Hollywood must register at St Kevin's and provide contact details.

10:30am: Pilgrims planning to walk from either Wicklow Gap or around Glendalough, are invited to make their way to St John's Church, Laragh. A minibus will be on hand to take people to the Wicklow Gap or the Monastic City.

11:00am, 12 midday, 1.00pm and 2.00pm: St John's Church, Laragh – A minibus will take pilgrims to Wicklow Gap, where they will be able to walk back to Glendalough along St Kevin's way.

5.00pm: Upper Lake, Glendalough – Pilgrims will gather at the stone ring fort on the shores of the Upper Lake for a short outdoor service of thanksgiving and prayer. A minibus will be available to take pilgrims back to Hollywood after this service.

Please feel free to join at any time throughout the day. The Rector is trying to organise a group to undertake the Wicklow Gap to Glendalough part of the walk, and if you would like to join in, please let him know.

Harvests

The Harvest Thanksgiving service in St Andrew's Malahide will be held on Sunday 22nd

September when the visiting preacher is Mark Acheson, diocesan reader based in Clontarf. Mark is a man of many tasks and experiences: chaplain to the Boys' Brigade and Administrator of Abbey Presbyterian Church, he is also Administrator of the Clontarf Business Association and Chair of SPADE, which was set up many years ago to bring employment to the North Inner City parish of St Paul, and which has been highly successful in 'kick-starting' small businesses from its base in the former Church.

For many years the School has played a part in this service and we look forward to the continuance of this tradition. Harvest reminds us of our dependence on good weather and had human work, and this is very important to remember at a time when food production has become both industrialised and globalised, not always to our advantage or long-term good.

As usual we will be having two harvest services in St Doulagh's on October 13th. At 7.00pm in the evening, the preacher is Ven. Neal O'Raw, a native of Coolock who is now Archdeacon of Glendalough and Rector of Donard and Dunlavin in West Wicklow. Much of Neal's ministry was in the west of Ireland until his return to Dublin a few

years ago. We are hoping to have some added musical involvement on this occasion, with music by the Harold's Cross Brass Band and other sources: details will be on the parish website.

Assistance in decoration of both churches is always welcome. St Andrew's will be decorated on the Saturday morning, and St Doulagh's on the Friday morning. Gifts of fruit and vegetables will be most welcome, even if you feel your arranging skills are not up to public display!

We ask all friends of Malahide and St Doulagh's to come along and join us for what are always very special occasions: to all as usual, Céad Míle Fáilte!

Car Boot Sales for St Doulagh's

We would like to thank all those who helped with these events on 8 Saturday mornings in the Parish Centre in aid of St Doulagh's Restoration Fund. Especial thanks are due to Emer Bryan, Hazel Bolton and Richard Firth who were there 'all hours'. Last year's sales in St Doulagh's were hampered by the lack of facilities on site, and also by the lack of footfall, and also by the risk of collisions due to restricted visibility for drivers at the field entrance. The scaffolding and restoration work at St Doulagh's this year made the situation even worse.

St Doulagh's could absorb a large number of sellers and that hampered us this year, but footfall improved, especially as we sent some of the team down to the Diamond with sandwich boards, but despite the small area of the car park, we made about €2000 and many friends.

Car Boot Sales are not simply for those trying to rid their attics of junk! We had a regular bookseller, and a copper worker and a maker of garden ornaments, among others! It was a most useful experience.

Alice Leahy Trust Collection

The Alice Leahy Trust does wonderful work with the victims of homelessness, from its base in the undercroft of the Iveagh Hostel, and Alice has been a forceful critic of the failure of our society to deal with the situation which makes homelessness such a serious problem in the capital of one of the wealthiest countries in Europe.

On the first Wednesday of each month, a team of volunteers from the Mothers' Union meets and sorts donations from the parish and wider community, and ensures that they get to their destination with the minimum of delay! A list of what can be accepted is on the parish website. If you cannot deliver on a Wednesday morning (1030 to 12noon), donations can be left at the Parish Centre beforehand.

Wednesday Coffee Mornings

This is held on the 1st Wednesday of a month in the coffee bar in the Parish Centre from 1030am to 12.00 noon, not co-incidentally the same time as the Alice Leahy Trust Collection. Communion Bread

There are some folk who strongly believe that the bread used at the Eucharist should be ordinary white bread, rather than the wafers we have been using for some time. Others prefer the wafers as more hygienic, and they are more biblical when we realise that the bread Jesus would have used at the Last Supper was the unleavened bread based on that used at the Passover.

Both types have their detractors: the use of white bread at the Reformation was due to the abuse to which the wafer was put, carried about in processions and worshipped as Christ himself by a largely uneducated laity. By the late 19th century, the Oxford Movement led to a rehabilitation of wafers as an alternative to bread, but in Ireland disestablishment led to an outlawing of wafer bread until very recent times: like other changes brought in then, the main reason was that if Rome did it, it must be wrong. Thankfully, the time when that sort of thinking ruled the Church of Ireland, has largely faded away.

We are looking at meaningful alternatives which enable the bread to be visibly broken. A soft roll which can be cut so that it divides at the breaking has been tried with some success and will be used at the main services over the next few months, with wafers remaining in use at the smaller services and the communion of the sick. Interestingly, those who wanted a reversion to bread have not, at the time of writing, made any comment on the matter.

Memorial Service

Each year a number of our parishioners are bereaved by the passing of loved members of their close families, and we remember them at a special service on or near 2nd November (The Feast of All Souls). This year's service will be on Friday 1st November (All Saint's Day) which is also the Vigil of All Souls', if we follow the ancient tradition that the day began at sunset.

Everyone is welcome to this service, and indeed, some of you may well have been bereaved but we have for various reasons, not been aware of it.

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in the country. There's a question over the 1600 period, a very turbulent period in history, as to whether it was in use then or not, but it certainly goes back to the 1700s.

'The church is well known in the area, and it's better known now. There's a small congregation, you might get twenty or thirty people, mostly older people, but now we're getting a lot of non-nationals too, Polish, Israeli and people from a lot of different backgrounds. It's no longer the old congregation, there's new people coming in, so it's very diverse.'

In 1989, former Taoiseach Charles Haughey facilitated a FÁS scheme which carried out significant maintenance and landscaping work on St Doulagh's. Work included the refurbishment of the crenulation stone work of the medieval tower, replacing the stone flooring of the vestry and the rebuilding of the graveyard walls and avenue walls. The almost derelict baptistery was also excavated and meticulously conserved to its original form.

Ken said: 'I would hope that the leaking would be fixed this year, then next year will get into the cleaning up of inside of it. There's a lot of rooms in the building. One of the rooms is being used now as a vestry, where the clergy robe and that sort of thing, but my feeling is it should be more than that.'

'There's another room there, what they call the hermit's cell, a tiny little room on the ground floor, and that could be used as a children's area during service. It could be used for something like that if it was floored, but it all has to be done sympathetically. We're not going to bring in plasterboard and modern materials, we'll keep it the way it should be.'

'People describe it as 'The Jewel in Fingal's Crown', but it should be gaining more attention. I think it's very important for Fingal, as a tourist attraction. It's not going to be as attractive as Swords Castle, but it's one of the best medieval buildings still standing.'

TOMATO BRUSCHETTA



Ingredients:

- 2 cloves garlic (minced)
- 4 tomatoes (seeded & diced)
- 2 tbsp fresh basil (chopped)
- Salt & pepper
- 1 x French stick
- ¼ extra virgin olive oil
- 1/3 cup Parmesan cheese

Method:

1. In a bowl combine garlic, tomato, basil, salt and pepper
2. Cut bread diagonally into ¾ inch slices
3. Brush with oil and grill until crisp and lightly browned
4. Turn slices over and spoon the tomato mixture over the bread
5. Sprinkle with Parmesan
6. Bake for 8-10mins at 425°F/210°C
