From the Rector

The last few months have been challenging for everyone, for society as a whole, for all those caught up with the coronavirus at its nastiest, for the sick, vulnerable and elderly. We have been made aware of the professionalism and courage of those engaged at the frontline of the battle in the health services, people who were often underpaid and overworked.

The battle and the war are two different things. We have been behaving as though the initial reduction in the virus will mean that all is over apart from a mopping up operation, but as I write this we are becoming all too aware that this is not so: the war is not over until one side is defeated and surrenders.

You might say that such warlike metaphors are not suitable for the editorial of a parish magazine, but in fact this is not true. The Bible frequently uses warlike metaphors when discussing the battle between good and evil and I think it quite appropriate when we consider the pain and suffering that this plague has brought, as well as disruption to economic and social activity, and to the whole sphere of education which is so essential to a modern society.

Even this mid-August week in which I am writing these notes, we have had the very essential task of our General Vestry elections seriously disrupted by a sudden and unflagged tightening of Government regulations. This very space should have been occupied by a list of those elected to serve our parish and to represent us in the Diocesan

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Postponed Easter Vestry Meeting

The much-delayed Easter General Vestry (or the Annual General Meeting, as the rector likes to call it), was held on Sunday 30th August. Originally scheduled for 17th April, it was rescheduled for 19th August, just over four months later (though that period has seemed like a long time to many people). However, that was the week the Covid 19 restrictions were tightened again, so it was put off again, to make sure that the parish could be compliant with the new requirements.

The meeting was embedded in a very much abbreviated Morning Prayer service. It was held in the Hall of the Parish Centre, which allowed for social distancing between the attendees, and for a through draught to ensure there was no build-up of unwelcome vapours. The dress code for the day was "full mask", which while allowing a degree of anonymity to those present, also allowed play to a sense of fashion in choice of style and colour in the masks.

The Rector presented his report on the year, an abridged version of which appears on page 3. While addressing the unexpected challenges that have emerged during the year, he paid tribute to the many people who have risen to those challenges and contributed their time and energy to meeting them.

The Rector's report was followed by the election of Parish Officers for the coming year. Details on page 4

Brian Brown presented the Parish finances, which reflected considerable building and maintenance activity during the year. Some of these were planned and prepared for: St. Doulagh's restoration, work on the Old School House, but urgent work on the ceiling of St. Andrew's Church, which caused it to be closed for some months, left the Parish in debt for the first time in many years. The Fund-raising Committee is working hard on ideas for bringing in the cash to deal with the debt of nearly €20,000.

The meeting closed with prayer promptly at 12.30.

18th July 2020, **Francis Lowe**, 76 Whitebeam Road, Clonskeagh, Dublin 14. Frank Lowe had grown up in Malahide but had lived for most of his life on the south side of the city. His funeral service took place in Sandford Church, after which he was interred in the family grave in St Andrew's Churchyard. We offer our sympathy to his wife, Lillian and his children Suzanne and Colin, and to all the family in their loss.

20th August, **Seward Morris**, 24 Yellow Walls Road. Seward was a very long-standing and faithful member of the parish and of the Mothers' Union, who retained her activity and energy into her 90s, and great mental clarity until her death. She was cremated after a service in Glasnevin Crematorium conducted by her son Fraser's great friend, Rev Daniel Owens, chaplain of St Columba's College. We offer our sympathy to Fraser, to Christine and to Gary her children and their families in their loss.

21st August, **Audrey Gilbert**, 53 Mountfield Park, Malahide. Audrey came to Malahide from her native England a number of years ago to be near her son, John, and his family. A shrewd businesswoman, she was never one to sit on the sidelines of society in retirement, and soon became involved with life in Malahide and brought her organisational gifts to bear on community activities and her local resident's association in which she remained involved until very recently. She was cremated at Dardistown and her ashes returned for burial to England. We offer our sympathy to her son, John and his family, her son Mark and to her daughter Philippa (Netherlands) in their loss.

26th March, cremated at Dardistown after service in St Andrew's Church, **John Robert Conor Moore**, 2 Grove Lawns, Malahide. John Moore was a parishioner of long standing. Originally from Crumlin, John founded a

construction business which was run on his principles of honesty and quality in a business which has had more than its fair share of chancers. He had not been in good health for some time and passed on after a short stay in hospital. We offer our sympathy to his wife, Hazel, and to his children Gary (Clontarf), Sharon (Seabury) and Jackie (Australia), and their families in their loss.

Return to worship

After three months, we were able to begin public worship again in the parish. It was a very strange period, but while the pandemic uncertainty was at its height. However, Morning Prayer was read every morning, and the Rector thanks those who turned up, and many people used the chapel for private prayer during this period.

Reopening for public worship was subject to a number of regulations, many of them making sense in the circumstances. However, at present it does not appear possible to use a place of worship more than once on a Sunday. We treat St Marnock's chapel as a separate space, but unfortunately it does not seem possible to make greater use of the chapel, and we are unable to provide an evening service, or the Toddler Service. The evening service was used for Messy Church, and also for a monthly prayer service for the sick, and one hopes that it will be possible to resume them at some stage in the future.

You may also notice that some services are described as 'Service of the Word'. This is a service of scripture readings and an address, followed by intercessions. We have been asked by the Diocese to have somewhat shorter services, as an aid to preventing accidental spread of coronavirus, and this service contains many familiar elements from Morning Prayer. Similarly the Eucharist is a shortened form of Holy Communion Two. At present the same readings are used at both services, including intercessions from the Diocese of Europe adapted to our circumstances.

What else about worship? You are welcome to bring and wear a face-covering, unless you are actually reading a lesson or leading intercessions. Sanitising gel will be available at the door as you enter, and you are asked to use it and also as you leave the church afterwards.

You will be asked by a steward to sit in a particular seat so as to preserve social distancing. Members of the same household may sit together. At the main services, there will be no prayer-books, but service leaflets will be provided. As part of the Government regulations, you are asked to fill in contact details on the leaflet and leave it behind you afterwards. In St Andrew's, you will also be asked to leave through a different door to the one you came in by. (Those with mobility problems should wait, and then leave the same way they entered). There will be no collection or offertory procession, but collection plates will be at both entrance and exit doors.

At the Peace, please do not touch your neighbour but maintain the recommended social distancing. We

Rector's Report to General Vestry Meeting, August 2020

The General Vestry met in strange times as was evident from its hosting in August instead of the usual 'Easter Vestry', although we were reviewing our affairs for 2019, not this year.

2019 was disturbed enough in the parish, especially when we realised the serious state of the plasterwork in St Andrew's Church, and we owe a special debt of gratitude to our financial and glebe teams, and in particular to our Glebewarden, Ian Watkins, whose voluntary commitment to this was absolutely monumental, especially as he was also involved in the refurbishing of the Old School House.

I pay tribute to our Hon. Treasurer and his team for the manner in which they faced the challenges of the year under review and have continued to do so in the subsequent unexpected challenges. A heartfelt 'thank you' to Ken McAllister, who managed the long-awaited project to re-mortar the tower in St Doulagh's tower, and the re-lighting of the area around the well.

For a number of reasons, 2019 was not an easy year for Parish Administrator Anne Taplin, but her on-going dedication to the task is a principal reason why the Parish Centre has continued to be a significant contributor to parish funds since it was built in 2005.

The churchwardens had a busy year with unexpected challenges and I thank them for their dedication and initiatives. Reet Dreimanis has been exemplary in her duties and has quickly become an essential part of St Doulagh's, as has Jennifer Young, ably assisted by John, and thanks also go to Graeme Tarbox and Linda Barry for the cheerful way they organised everything in St Andrew's.

Our lay readers were active during the year under review, and I have also received support when needed from Rev Ken Sherwood and Rev Kingsley Long. The choir members have also been faithful in as much as circumstances allow and I thank Rodney for his work with them and also for his maintenance (with his wife Sue) of our temperamental organ which would be costly otherwise.

Many favourable comments have been made about the state of the grounds in both churches, a result of the hard work of Tommy Delaney and his son Ruairi. New flowers and shrubs planted along the northern boundary of the Churchyard have transformed a very neglected area into a place of hope and life.

Olive Haynes has maintained the life of the Mothers' Union, and the Table Tennis Club and Bowls Club continued their activity during the year. We also thank Nadine Watters, for all she has done for the Girls' Brigade Company since taking over as Captain.

The current coronavirus pandemic is a matter on its own, and I hope that by next year's General Vestry meeting, we will be able to say we have got through the worst crisis the parish and our country have ever faced. I thank all those who volunteered to supervise and assist the resumption of worship in our churches, especially Emer Bryan and Anne Winslow-O'Dea.

The General Vestry was also about electing officers for the future, not just a Select Vestry and a clutch of wardens, but also this year Nominators and Synods persons, posts of major responsibility.

Communion will be in one form, using wafer bread. When the celebrant communicates himself, wafers will be brought to a table in the chancel, and communicants come forward and take their wafer, and then replace their face-covering while returning to their seat.

The 8.00 am Sunday service and the 11.00 am Wednesday service have both resumed. At these, the traditional (Form One) service is used. The same comments apply as to the usual Form Two service.

Many of you will find some of these features rather strange. But we live in strange times, and it is essential that we as Christians gather regularly for worship and spiritual strengthening so that we can live in these unsettling times, conscious of the Holy Spirit empowering us.

Streaming of services

From mid-March, normal church worship was closed down because of the coronavirus. It was particularly difficult in St Andrew's in that we had already been disrupted by the repair work in the church from October, and worship had only resumed with the Service of Re-dedication on 1st March, less than three weeks before the lockdown. Thanks to Colin Carey, we began a weekly service from St Marnock's Chapel which was streamed through the internet which, despite inadequate equipment, provided something of a substitute for the 'real thing', and which formed a basis for the Service of the Word which we have been using since worship was allowed to resume. Thanks to those who provided lighting to augment the light, and to those who read lessons and led prayer: on Pentecost, we experimented with a Eucharist, and this also enabled us to find a safe way of partaking in Communion.

The streaming continued to the resumption of worship, and despite inadequacies of light and volume, continued to be looked at by a considerable number of people, either at the time or during the ensuing week.

Baptisms

There may be a backlog of baptisms due to the coronavirus situation. We are now in a position to resume baptisms, but not at the main Sunday worship service as before. Therefore baptisms will only be held by special arrangement, and parishioners wishing to arrange for a baptism must contact the Rector by email or at 086-8153277 and make arrangements. The preferred time is on a Sunday afternoon which enables sanitising of the Church in accordance with the regulations, to be undertaken after the usual Sunday service. Only one candidate can be baptised at any baptism service.

Confirmation

The diocese is rearranging the confirmation services

which had to be cancelled when the pandemic struck, and we hope to have a service in November. The actual date has not been confirmed yet but candidates will be contacted as soon as it is known.

Hospital visits

Since the coronavirus pandemic began, strict security has been instituted in hospitals and nursing homes in order to avoid the return of Covid-19 which has caused so much pain and anguish within the health service. **THIS MEANS THAT CLERGY CANNOT VISIT IN HOSPITALS OR NURSING HOMES IN THE MANNER WE HAVE EXPECTED IN THE PAST.** Hospital chaplains are on the staff of most hospitals, and clergy are also subject to visiting restrictions in nursing homes.

Please tell the Rector when someone is in hospital or in a nursing home so that they can be included in prayer but as things stand at present do not say that they will pay a visit, unless the family make arrangements with the nursing home. As things are at the moment, this is very unlikely to be given.

Special Services

Covid-19 regulations limit the numbers attending services. Current regulations not only prescribe social distancing, but also that there should not be more than 50 in the Church. Hopefully this will be relaxed (it applies even to the largest Roman Catholic Churches!) but the current capacity in St Andrew's is 50, in St Doulagh's 23 and St Marnock's Chapel 15. The numbers may increase as members of a household can sit together, but the 50 total applies. (Should more than 50 attend St Andrew's, the next 15 can listen to the service from the Chapel)

We will have a harvest service at the beginning of October but it is limited to whatever total applies at the time, and while the readings will be those of harvest-time, it will be the usual service and there will not be a visiting preacher.

It may not be possible to hold the Service of Remembrance on All Soul's Day to remember parishioners who have died or who have been bereaved during the previous twelve months, and Remembrance Sunday may also be affected. Indeed, one wonders what Christmas will bring: let us pray that in some way, we will be able to celebrate in a meaningful manner this great Christian celebration.

Flower arrangements

Norma Sherwood, who has organised the flower rota in St Andrew's Church, has retired, and we thank her for her devotion to this for many years. While we are presently using silk flowers (part of the anti-coronavirus regulations!), at some time in the future we will be able to get back to being able to once again use the 'flowers of the field' again and ask for volunteers to take on the job. It does not mean an ability as a flower arranger, but a



and General Synod, and as Parochial Nominators to represent the parish should a vacancy occur as Rector of this parish.

The meeting has now been re-fixed for Sunday 30th August at the morning service in St Andrew's. Under diocesan regulations, the General Vestry Meeting, which has already been postponed from April by the Diocesan Councils, must be completed by early September, so that the Diocesan Synod can be held on 20th October, and new officers have a mandate to act. If we do not have the meeting, we will not be able to be represented in the Synods and will have no nominators in place to elect a new Rector in a vacancy.

Much hard work has been undertaken by a small sub-committee led by Anne Winslow, Emer Bryan and Brian Brown to get worship back on track, and most services have resumed with strict precautions being taken to minimise any danger of infection. These same precautions will be in force at the General Vestry, and thank you to all who have put so much time and energy into this. Thanks to their work, we can once again engage in the worship of God which is the bedrock of Christian life, witness and continuity, knowing that we do so safe from physical harm in these strange and unexpected times we now inhabit.
